Pupil Premium Grant (PPG) for 2018/19 was: £28,620

The following table shows how the grant was allocated and the impact.

Provision	Intended impact	Impact
Increased teaching assistant hours to provide 'reaction groups' every afternoon on objectives taught in R, W, M, SPaG, Phonics.	Pupils eligible for pupil premium make at least expected progress in all areas.	Reaction groups provided for all pupil premium children in all year groups to support outcomes.
Increase in specialist SEND teaching hours.	Early intervention for vulnerable pupils to address specific needs and improve outcomes.	Specialist SEND teaching provided to support outcomes.
Training a new ELSA. Specialist update training for the ELSA Teaching Assistant.	Early ELSA support for vulnerable pupils to address specific social and emotional needs and improve outcomes.	Before and after assessments completed by ELSA to show impact of interventions.
Funding for educational visits, residential visits, uniform and milk.	All children eligible for FSM are involved in all activities.	All Pupil Premium children were funded to attend residential, school visits. All Pupil Premium children were offered milk and uniform.

From 2018 / 2019 the school had 18 children (19%) who received PP funding.
