# Monday 22<sup>nd</sup> May - Year 5 & 6 Day Visit to Weymouth Outdoor Education Centre

We will need to leave school promptly at 8.20am and will return for 5.30pm. This will enable us to fit in all that I have planned! The children will take part in several activities during the day:

Offsite activities from Castle Cove Sailing Club -

- \*Tandem kayaks (sit on top in pairs)
- \*Mega SUP (stand up paddleboards up to 12 people on!)

## Onsite activities -

- \*Indoor tunnelling and caving
- \*Indoor traverse climbing wall
- \*Outdoor climbing tower

The cost is likely to be around  $\pounds 50$  per child. More details to follow nearer the time.

## Year 6 Residential Trip – 2 nights – To Carey Education Centre, Wareham

Monday 26th June – leave school around 9am

Wednesday 28th June – return to school in the afternoon

The children will sleep outside in bell tents (usually 3-6 children per tent) for the 2 nights and will take part in outdoor activities on site over the 3 days. I hope the activities will include tree climbing, archery, tunnelling, low ropes and shelter building. The cost is likely to be around £170 per child. More details to follow.

There are some children in the class who are not ready to follow the year 6 maths curriculum. At parent evenings, I spoke to parents on an individual basis to discuss the learning most appropriate for your child. Your child's homework set on Sumdog will link to their learning in school.

#### Maths Homework

Homework will be set on Sumdog every Friday for the children to complete at home by the following week.

This work will link to the lessons taught during that week so is important to consolidate your child's learning from school.

Mrs Higgs will be teaching R.E. on Thursdays. Our focus in RE this term is Christianity. The children will be working on the first Salvation Unit of work where they will be considering the key question: 'What did Jesus do to save human beings?' In doing so they will try to explain what Christians mean when they say that Jesus' death was a sacrifice and try to weigh up the value and impact of ideas of sacrifice in their own lives and the world today.

#### Music



Mrs Higgs will be teaching music on Thursdays. In Music, this half term, we are continuing our work on 'Key and Time Signatures'. The children will learn how to play the scales of G major and F major on the Glockenspiels and learn what the difference is between different time signatures. In addition, they will practice composing and recording using digital technology through either a Graphic Score or Music Notepad.

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#### Dance

Pupils will focus on developing an idea or theme into dance choreography. They will work in pairs and groups using different choreographing tools to create dances e.g. formations, timing, dynamics. Pupils will have opportunities to choreograph, perform and provide feedback on dance. Pupils think about how to use movement to convey ideas, emotions, feelings and characters.

#### Fitness

Pupils will take part in a range of fitness challenges to test and record their scores. They will learn different components of fitness including speed, stamina, strength, coordination, balance and agility. Pupils will be given opportunities to work at their maximum and improve their fitness levels. They will need to persevere when they get tired or when they find a challenge hard and are encouraged to support others to do the same. Pupils are asked to recognise areas in which they make the most improvement using the scores they have collected.

# Languages - French

In Desert Class, French is taught by specialist French teachers from Shaftesbury School, Mr Gardiner and Miss Edwards. They will continue to come into school on Wednesday afternoons to deliver these lessons.

Our new focus will be Daily Routine and Time. This will include

- \*Telling the time
- \*Daily routines school days and weekends

The children will develop their listening skills, paired speaking, extend their reading skills and their use of bilingual dictionaries.

# Jigsaw



PSHE Education (Personal, Social, Health and Economic Education) is a planned programme of learning through which children and young people acquire the knowledge, understanding and skills they need to successfully manage their lives – now and in the future. As part of a whole-school approach, PSHE Education develops the qualities and

attributes pupils need to thrive as individuals, family members and members of society.

Our next unit is **Healthy Me.** In this Puzzle, the children discuss taking responsibility for their own physical and emotional health and the choices linked to this. They talk about different types of drugs and the effects these can have on people's bodies. The class discuss exploitation as well as gang culture and the associated risks. They also talk about mental health / illness and that people have different attitudes towards this. They learn to recognise the triggers for and feelings of being stressed and that there are strategies they can use when they are feeling stressed.

# General Class Information from initial letter – to re-read if you missed anything ...

\*All of the children have now got their new reading books and Reading Records (monkey books). Reading Records will come home at the end of the school day and need to return to school the next morning.

\*The children have stuck their log ons for the online learning platforms in the front of their Reading Records. Please encourage them to use these at home as much as possible.

\*Homework will be set on a Friday and needs to be completed by the following Thursday. Please see the homework expectations set out below.

\*We will be using our Playground Fitness Track on the playground at various points throughout the week. Children are welcome to bring their trainers in their school bags ready for these sessions if they wish but do not have to.

## Reading

The children in Years 5 & 6 are expected to read at home several times a week (if possible, on a daily basis). Some children may still enjoy reading to an adult and need this support, whereas others may be able and happy to read independently. However, to develop their comprehension skills it is still important that they read with an adult so that a discussion can take place. Here are some example questions which you may wish to use to help to develop your child's understanding of a text:

What has happened in the story so far? (summarise)

How is ? (a character) feeling? Why? How do you know?

Why did? (a character) behave / act in that way?

What do you think might happen next?

Why is the book structured in this way?

Can you find a word/phrase which means ...?

Who would you recommend this book to? Why?

I am more than happy for the child or adult to write in their reading records. Reading records should be written in at least once a week (by the child or adult).

# SPaG (spelling, punctuation and grammar)

The **SPaG** curriculum will be taught in discrete lessons and then these skills revisited and applied in any writing activities across the curriculum and the children's independent longer writing pieces.

The children will have spellings set each Friday which they must practise and learn at home. It is the children's choice how they practise these at home – some may find writing them down over and over beneficial whereas others may prefer to practise verbally. In school, they will complete activities to support them in learning these words also in our multi-sensory spelling sessions.

These are practical activities which could be used at home also.

Here are some examples:

- Using an empty washing up liquid bottle fill it with water and the children squirt their spelling word onto the tarmac or patio
- Finger painting
- Writing their spelling words in playdough using an old key or edge of a fork
- Running in the shape of the letters
- Using scrabble letters to create the word

• Over-write – writing the word over and over on top of each other in different colours As long as the spellings are learnt, I don't mind how they do this!

They will have a spelling test each Friday to check they know these spellings words. Spelling is a large chunk of the SPaG curriculum and SAT tests so please support and encourage your child in learning their spellings each week. Once learnt, they must also keep re-visiting the spelling words to ensure that they retain them over longer periods of time.

## Numeracy - Times Tables

By the end of Year 4, all of the children should know all of their times tables up to 12  $\times$  12. They should now be improving their speed of recall. The children must practice their times tables at home regularly - in the car on the way to school or walking to school is a perfect opportunity for quick fire times tables questions  $\odot$ 

They will have a times tables test each Friday. There are some really good websites available to support children in practicing their times tables. Every child in Desert class has a subscription on Times Tables Rock Stars. Please encourage your child to make use of this as much as possible to become even speedier at recalling them!
